She delivered steelhead eggs to three Windsor elementary schools participating in the program. The teachers had their aquariums setup in their

classrooms. The kids would learn how to carefully drop them into the controlled chilled aquarium water, feed and watch the eggs grow and transition into alevin, and then into fry. Once the eggs reach the fry stage, the kids will scoop them up from the aguariums to release into the main stem of the Russian River.

"Why didn't I do fun stuff like this in school?" Cat wondered. "Let's do more of this with salmon!"

The last Saturday casting clinic will be on March 2, at noon. Beginning March 14th, the casting clinics will be every Thursday from 4:30 –7 pm. It is exciting that we will be able to resume the FFI Skills Development Program. Maria de la Fuente and Angela Zahra will provide Grid Sheets for women to track their progress. Currently, six of us are enjoying a knot and fly-tying clinic led by Jeff Cratty and Don Shaw.

There will be a beginner fly-fishing day trip in late March or early April.
